Welcome to Advent at Bethany 2023

Advent is a time to get ready for the birth of Christ. For thousands of years of church history, God's people have practiced this four-week preparation phase. It is a time of reflection, joy, contemplation, and consideration of the meaning of Jesus' birth. It is a time for us to truly consider Christ.

As a church, we're committed to reading the Bible from beginning to end this year. We call it Rooted, a 44-week journey from "In the beginning" of Genesis 1 to "Amen" in Revelation 22. Please READ WITH US this month, and, if at all possible, engage the devotions and questions with a friend or family member.

We have titled our Advent series FORETOLD. The birth of Jesus was foretold in the Old Testament. Isaiah prophesied that when the Messiah was born, He would be called **Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace**. By focusing on the names of Christ from Isaiah 9:6, we will connect the New Testament stories of Jesus' birth with the Old Testament prophecies about the birth of our Lord. To start the new year, we turn to God as Advocate and will engage a selection of readings from other prophets—some revealing the longing for Messiah, and others pointing to the effects Messiah will have.

May you find meaning and purpose in the pages ahead. In a world of temporality, may you experience both the foretelling and fulfillment of Christ bringing peace, truth, and belonging to us all.

May Christ shine in your hearts and in your homes this Advent Season,

Rooted Act III: Foretold—Advent 2023

Before babies are born, parents stress over the first big decision of parenthood. What will the name be? Will it be a family name? Will it be the name of a historical figure or a mentor? Will it be a conventional name or something more... let's call it "unique?" Google will be searched, books flipped through, advice sought (and likely ignored!). After all of this, a fitting name will be given.

In the Old Testament, names were more than just names; they were aspirations, reminders, and descriptions of what the child would hopefully be and accomplish. Long before God sent His son, Jesus, He selected names that would perfectly describe the Messiah:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel. -Isaiah 7:14

Matthew connects this verse to the birth of Jesus (Matthew 1:23). One of the great themes of the Book of Isaiah is spiritual light and darkness. In Matthew 4:16, Jesus quotes Isaiah chapter 9:

**The people living in darkness have seen a great light;
on those living in darkness a light has dawned.**

It is in this same chapter that Isaiah proclaims the Messiah will be called:

**Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God,
Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. -Isaiah 9:6**

Isaiah gives these descriptions of the Messiah, and centuries later, the Gospels show how Jesus embodied each of them. Of the eighty-five quotes or references to Isaiah in the New Testament, nine of them are in Matthew! Matthew writes his gospel as a portrait of Jesus as the Messiah promised to Abraham, and, in so doing, builds the bridge between the Old and New Testaments.

December 4

ISAIAH 2:1–5; 6:1–8 7:13–14

“Let us walk in the light of the Lord.” This deeply encouraging verse promises that, though darkness will attempt to thwart God's purposes in our lives, we are called to walk differently because we are God's people. As Jesus would say later in His ministry:

“You are the light of the world.” As we walk with God, the Wonderful Counselor, in every situation, we ourselves become God's light.

PRAYER

Lord, meet me in the days ahead. Thank You for coming and calling me into relationship. Lord, send me into this Advent season with purpose and patience to wait upon You.

December 5

ISAIAH 9:1–7

When I discovered that “**פֶּלַע יוֹעֵזֵר**” (pele' yo'etz) in Isaiah 9:6 could be better understood as “Wonder or Marvel” Counselor, my perspective completely shifted. Until then, I envisioned Jesus as a tender infant, but I failed to grasp the profound depth of His power. It struck me that **Jesus entered this world not as a soft-spoken advisor but as a force—the Almighty Lord, with unmatched authority and strength.**

PRAYER

Hallelujah Lord Jesus! All power and authority are yours!

December 6

ISAIAH 11:1–9

If you’ve ever seen a “nurse stump” while hiking, this is what Isaiah sees (11:1). Sin and violence cut off Isaiah’s people—and don’t we feel that too? But Isaiah says look: there’s something growing! In the true vine (Jesus), we are grafted into the coming world where dead stumps sprout green—literally a “re-Genesis” (Matthew 19:28). Faith is standing firm and waiting for God to grow this new world.

PRAYER

Father, where I am dead and cut down like a stump, speak Your word over me, heal me, and make me grow again with Your life.

December 7

ISAIAH 12:2–6

Even in moments of overwhelming fear, proclaiming “**I will trust and not be afraid**” orients me toward God and brings comfort. This passage exemplifies a beautiful progression that naturally unfolds when I lean on God’s strength: it results in worship. When I realize how desperately I need the Source of my salvation, strength, defense, and joy—I can’t help but sing.

PRAYER

Lord, I admit that I am often filled with fear, wrestling with worry, and struggling with doubt. Help me with my unbelief, increase my trust, and fix my gaze on your Son, Jesus, the Wonderful Counselor.

December 8

MATTHEW 1:1–25

I feel called to slow down through the list of names at the beginning of this chapter. These are people. Families. History. Context. God knew each of them intimately, just as He knows me intimately. I consider Judah's transformation, Ruth's perseverance—each a part of God's story—and this list ends with the birth of Christ, reminding me that God has a plan and that **every story matters**.

PRAYER

God, please help me to remember that You know me intimately and that **I belong in Your story**.

MATTHEW 2

God's hand is apparent as He shows up in dreams and directs the steps of those who protect Christ in His infancy, but there is also heartache and evil as Herod edges for power. It is in the duality of this story and my own that I am struck by both God's goodness and His desire to repair the brokenness caused by evil. My hope is in both truths this season.

PRAYER

Lord, help me see Your hand in the greater story of my life and how You are **redeeming even the hardest of stories**.

December 11

ISAIAH 25:2–9, 26:1–9

Isaiah 25 describes a feast for all peoples (v. 6), from all nations (v. 7), when death is swallowed up forever (v. 8) on God’s Holy Mountain. It invites us—in the language of the Psalm 23—“to feast in the presence of our enemies.” In Isaiah 2, we’re given the PURPOSE of God’s Holy Mountain—a beacon of reconciliation! Swords into plowshares!

PRAYER

Be present at our table, Lord.

Be here and everywhere adored.

Thy children bless and grant that we

May feast in paradise with Thee.

ISAIAH 32:1–4, 16–20, 33:2

Isaiah’s words provide reasons for hope: a glorious future and the promise of a righteous King with assistants that will meet people’s needs. This Mighty God allows me the privilege to assist and partner in Kingdom-building. I am to be shelter to the lost and lonely, the unbelieving, poor, and needy; a refuge and of service to the unchurched, under-churched, and even the over-churched! Being a music lover, the lyrics of a praise song from the 1980s come to mind as I process the happy future of living rightly with God: **My life is in You, Lord. My strength is in You.**

PRAYER

Loving Lord, show me with whom I can share the shelter and reassurance of God's love.

ISAIAH 35

Read Isaiah 35 again (and again!). Notice “what is” (wilderness, dry land, desert, weak hands and knees, anxious hearts...) and what God “will do” (gladness, blossoming, rejoicing, strengthening, leaping, singing...). Let the vision of Isaiah 35 be your vision for your actual life and circumstances today.

PRAYER

Lord, through Your Holy Spirit, instill the hope of **what You can do** in my heart and mind today.

MATTHEW 4:1–17

God's grace takes me by surprise. The Light of the World came not to the power center of Jerusalem, but to Galilee, a forgotten corner of a conquered land. **God remembers the forgotten.** Even in darkness, He sees all of me—the good, bad, and messy—and forgives me. Trusting this, let me repent as Jesus preached and accept the grace given to me.

PRAYER

Father, grant me the faith to trust that You are my light in the darkness and that Your light is enough.

MATTHEW 8:1–4, 17

A man with leprosy kneels before Jesus and says, “Lord if you are willing, you can make me clean.” It stood out to me that he doesn’t ask, “Can you” or “Will you;” he says, “You can.” He had faith that God would heal him. I wonder what my prayer life might look like if I **change my phrasing from “Can you” to “You can.”**

PRAYER

Jesus, teach me to trust in Your will and know that You are the Mighty God who heals.

MATTHEW 12

Matthew gives us a ringside seat. As one of the 12 disciples, he sees Jesus firsthand healing, teaching, and challenging the religious establishment. Then, in the midst of it all, Matthew shows us what he REALLY SEES: Jesus fulfilling Isaiah’s ancient prophecy of the Messiah—one who brings hope and justice in a gentle, humble, yet powerful and ultimate way; not only for the Jews, but for everyone... even for me.

PRAYER

Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, **fill me** with Your hope today.

Through these simple acts of faithfulness, God is cultivating a deeper sense of righteousness and hope.

December 25

LUKE 2:1–20

Christmas has become the king of holidays—full of special gatherings, fancy meals, festive outfits, and anticipated traditions—but I love that this passage emphasizes the humble birth of King Jesus. The most significant event in all of human history—a beautiful collision of heaven and earth—comes through unlikely people in ordinary places; not the way we might expect, and yet, exactly as God intended.

PRAYER

Jesus, help us to see You today through unlikely people in ordinary places!

LUKE 1:39–55

Growing up in Iran, I learned the Assyrian greeting Shlamaloukh (“peace be upon you”). This language is a version of Aramaic (the language of Elizabeth and Mary) and very close to Arabic and Hebrew. The Assyrian women in our church were like my aunties. God's Spirit announced His greatest gift to the world through such humble women whom He “has lifted up” and through whom He has blessed us all.

Praise you, oh most high God, for **we are not alone** or without hope.

LUKE 1:67-79

Luke 1:67 starts with God's fulfillment of His promises to His people, prophets, and the oath God swore to Abraham. Zechariah reminds us of an even bigger promise to be fulfilled: The one coming will bring... knowledge of salvation... forgiveness of sins... tender mercy... light... guidance. Trusting in God's promises shows us a new way: a path reliant on Him, a "path of peace" described in Philippians 4:6-7:

**Do not be anxious about anything,
but in every situation, by prayer and petition,
with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.
And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will
guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.**

PRAYER

Jesus, thank You for Your faithfulness in my life. Please help me to remember that You guide our feet onto the path of peace.

December 28

MICAH 5:2, 6:1-8

When God called Abraham, He promised that "all peoples on earth would be blessed through Him." From Abraham and Sarah came the nation of Israel, God's chosen people. To Abraham, God promised the land of Canaan. Through these people, God would bless all the peoples on earth. We see this blessing brought to fullness in Jesus Christ—the King born to rule over all the nations.

Jesus, heir to the throne of David, we thank You for fulfilling Your Father's plan of redemption.

MATTHEW 28:16–20

When rulers seek to expand their kingdom, they send soldiers—those who mete out violence and destruction to conquer. They don't send peacekeepers; they don't offer comfort or acceptance. Everyone shows us who they are, not by their words, but by their actions. Jesus shows who he is: the deliverer, one who saves not a mass of faceless people, but individually. You. Me. Everyone. Forever there when we need him.

PRAYER

Jesus, thank you for accepting me as I am and bringing me the peace that I need.

NEHEMIAH 1:7–10, 8:10

Nehemiah speaks with hope for the future in this passage. But right before this, in verse 4, he says, "I sat down and wept. I mourned for days." In times of turmoil, which rightly call for weeping and mourning, it's hard for me to find hope. Where does this ability come from for Nehemiah? How do we—as individuals and as a church—weep and mourn, yet also summon hope?

PRAYER
